
2023 OKLAHOMA COUNTY TEEN BIRTH RATE QUICK STATS




GOOD NEWS: Oklahoma County's teen birth rate has decreased by 57% since 2013! And the teen birth rate has been trending downward since 2008.

MORE WORK TO BE DONE: Oklahoma has the 5th highest teen birth rate in the United States and Oklahoma County has the highest number of teen births in the state.

SO WHAT?

- There is causal evidence that funding for more comprehensive sex education leads to an overall reduction in the teen birth rate at the county level.
- While the American Academy of Pediatrics² and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists³ agree that contraceptive access is a key component of adolescent health care, most young people around the country face barriers to accessing it.⁴

So, we have lots of work to do. That's why **honestly** is working towards a culture in which opportunities for youth to pursue education, careers, and well-being are not limited by teen pregnancy.






Our guiding principles compel us to anchor our work in equity, acknowledge the diverse needs of all young people, and guide our efforts based on data, research, and outcomes. This means recognizing that systemic issues, historic inequities, and community-level barriers cause disparities in teen birth rates.






DIVERSE NEEDS: While white non-Hispanic teens in Oklahoma account for the highest number of teen births, they do not have the highest teen birth rate. Black, multiracial, and white Hispanic teens experience higher teen birth rates than other race and ethnicity groups, which reflects historic and systemic disparities.

"THE COUNT" = The teen birth count tells us the number of births to females aged 15-19

"THE RATE" = The teen birth rate tells us the number of births per 1,000 females aged 15-19.

OLDER TEENS: Older teens consistently have higher birth rates. In 2022, 73% (n=439) of Oklahoma County's teen births were from 18- and 19-year-old teens.
