Our communities have faced profound challenges—public health crises, shifting policies, and growing misinformation—that have impacted every aspect of life, especially for young people navigating their health and wellness.

From 2019 to 2023, the teen birth rate in Oklahoma dropped by an incredible 27.3%, surpassing the ambitious goal we set in Momentum Matters. It reflects the hard work of everyone in our Collaboration—partners, peers, educators, and advocates—who showed up for young people, even when the path forward was unclear. 

OUR VISION



Honestly and the Collaboration are both driven by three key areas: Inform, Connect, Engage.

These objectives are what drives the collaborative synergy between honestly, its partners, and our local community.

Inform

Empower young people and the adults in their lives with comprehensive, medically-accurate, and age-appropriate sexual health information.

Connect

Facilitate relationships between our collaboration and the larger community to ensure our youth have access to resources.

Engage

Create an inclusive community-wide movement by driving participation and investment in youth sexual health.

COLLECTIVE IMPACT

The Collaboration is structured using the Collective Impact model. It starts with a common agenda (Like our strategic plan, Momentum Matters), establishes mutual accountability between partners, encourages continuous communication, and has a strong backbone (*honestly*) that brings diverse partners together.

Imagine that every organization is coming to a potluck. *Honestly* provides the table, plates, and silverware, and Collaboration members each bring their own signature dish (direct service in schools, resources for homeless youth, resources for youth in foster care, etc.) That makes for a tastier, more efficient meal! We organize, platform, research and provide resources so our partners can do what they do best.




DATA HIGHLIGHTS

Good news: Oklahoma County's teen birth rate has decreased by 57% since 2013 and has been trending downward since 2008!

More work to be done: Oklahoma has the 5th highest teen birth rate in the United States and Oklahoma County has the highest number of teen births in the state.



TEEN BIRTH RATES BY COUNTY 2023



*This number represents the average teen birth rate in all Oklahoma counties excluding Oklahoma and Tulsa County.

We aim to reduce systemic inequities and community-level barriers in Oklahoma County that perpetuate disparate health outcomes.

Our guiding principles compel us to anchor our work in equity, acknowledge the diverse needs of all young people, and guide our efforts based on data, research, and outcomes. This means recognizing that systemic issues, historic inequities, and community-level barriers cause disparities in teen birth rates.







Diverse Needs


While white non-Hispanic teens in Oklahoma account for the highest number of teen births, they do not have the highest teen birth rate.

Black, multiracial, and white Hispanic communities experience higher teen birth rates than other race and ethnicity groups, which reflects historical and systemic disparities.





"The Count" = The teen birth count tells us the number of births to females aged 15-19 "The Rate" = The teen birth rate tells us the number of births per 1,000 females aged 15-19




We prioritize data, research, and outcomes. While teen pregnancy can affect anyone, research shows there are local disparities and inequities by age, race, and geography. That is why we focus efforts toward underserved populations.

In 2021, we identified several priority zip codes that see a disproportionate amount of teen births in Oklahoma county. We learned more about specific community needs in those areas by recording existing resources and gaps in services. This helped us learn more about what the Collaboration can do to provide culturally responsive resources for youth. We continued to provide that data to partners into FY24.

Additionally, the U.S. Office of Population Affairs identified several youth populations who may need additional support: Children of immigrants, homeless youth, youth in foster care, youth in the juvenile justice system, LGBTQ+ youth, and youth with disabilities. All of these priority populations are represented through key community partners in the Collaboration, ensuring these youth are prioritized using expert guidance.





Older Teens

Older teens consistently have higher birth rates. In 2023, 73% of Oklahoma County's teen births were from 18- and 19-year-old teens.



• There is causal evidence that funding for more comprehensive sex education leads to an overall reduction in the teen birth rate at the county level. (1)

· While the American Academy of Pediatrics (2) and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (3) agree that contraceptive access is a key component of adolescent health care, most young people around the country face barriers to accessing it. (4)

So, we have lots of work to do. That's why honestly is working towards a culture in which opportunities for youth to pursue education, careers, and well-being are not limited by teen pregnancy.


